DEATH OF WM. J. LANDES A SEVERE BLOW TO COUNTY

TRUSTEE OF CARROLLTON TOWNSHIP DIED AT HOME EAST OF CITY OF FRIDAY

W. J. Landes, one of the most highly respected and widely known citizen-farmers of Carroll County, and trustee of Carrollton Township, died at his home east of this city Friday morning at 5:30 o'clock after a week's illness of pneumonia, complicated with other ailments from which he had been a sufferer for a number of years. Deceased met with an accident at Indianapolis Dec. 8, the results of which it is thought contributed largely to his death. he fell unconscious in attempting to alight from a street car and his injuries were of such a serious nature that he was confined in a hospital in that city for a week before being brought home. For some time after being brought home he was in a critical condition, at one period of his illness his friends fearing for the worst. But with careful nursing and the skill of the best physicians he gradually began to improve and several weeks ago there was such a marked change in his condition that he was able to leave his home and transact some official business connected with his office, and attend to the regular routine of home and farm affairs.

His many friends, however, began to hope for his ultimate recovery, but one week before his death he was stricken with pneumonia. A nurse was called and everything the nurse, physicians, family and friends could do was done to combat the disease, but he gradually grew worse until the end.

William Jasper Landes was a son of John and Julia A. Landes, and was born on the old Landes homestead in Carrollton Township, May 22, 1852, at the time of his death being 63 years, 9 months and 3 days of age. From birth he had resided continuously on the farm where he died, with the exception of a year's temporary residence with his family in California.

In his earlier life Mr. landes followed the profession of school teaching, and for twenty-seven years taught in the schools of the county. Many of the middle aged residents of Carrollton Township and other parts of the county can vividly recall many pleasant incidents connected with their school life when Mr. Landes was their instructor. In his day Mr. Landes was considered one of the foremost educators of the county and always took a leading part in any movement to promote the best interests of the public schools.

When only fifteen years of age deceased united with the Sharon Baptist Church and throughout his entire life lived a dedicated and faithful member. He was one of the most active members of the Sharon congregation and at the time of his death held the offices of Trustee and Deacon. For many years he was secretary of the Judson Baptist Association and through his untiring efforts and devotion to the work assigned him the Association grew to be one of the important factors in promoting the best interest of the church in many parts of the state.

At the time of his death deceased was Trustee of Carrollton Township and he was a careful and painstaking official whose whole aim was for the best interests of the schools and its patrons. For some time before his death, however, he was unable to transact the business connected with his office, the affairs of the office being left to others. In his earlier life Mr. Landes traveled quite extensively and was well informed on important topics.

He was a man of the highest moral, religious and intellectual character and the absence of his influence will be keenly felt in this community where he resided and the county at large.

By his careful business methods he had obtained a goodly share of this world's goods, at the time of his death owning one of the best farms in Carrollton Township.

Deceased leaves to mourn a wife and one daughter, Jessie; two brothers, Oscar of this city; and Frank of North Carolina, besides a large number of other relatives and friends. The funeral was conducted at the Sharon Baptist Church Sunday at 11 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Essicks, pastor, and was largely attended, many relatives and friends coming from a distance. County Superintendent P. B. Hemming and the twelve township trustees, constituting the County Board of Education, attended the funeral as a body. Interment was made in the Sharon Cemetery.

Mr. McCain will be 89 years of age on November 8 and his wife will be 81 years old on November 12. Parents of Mrs. McCain, Elder Abraham Flora and Lydia Brubaker Flora, were pioneer residents of Monroe Township and at one time owned a large part of the land on which the town of Flora is now located. The McCains have resided on the same farm continuously since their marriage 60 years ago.

The celebrants are known and beloved for their interest in community affairs and in the local life of the township where they have spent the greater part of their lives. Mr. McCain was trustee from 1895 to 1900.

Musicians both, the McCains have contributed to the musical development, not only of Carrollton Township, but also of Carroll County, and Mr. McCain considers the introduction of music into rural schools as his crowning achievement while trustee. He also established the Carrollton Township High

School. Both Mr. and Mrs. McCain were members of the Wheeling Choral Union, the former having been a charter member of the organization.

Both have been active in religious work. Both lifelong members of the Sharon Baptist Church with Mr. McCain acting as chorister for sixty years and teaching a Sunday School class for nearly as long a period.

The McCains have six children, twenty grandchildren and six great grandchildren. Three of the grandchildren are in military service, two of them are overseas.

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D.J. MCCAIN DIES AT HOME EAST OF FLORA [JUNE 11, 1949]

FUNERAL RITES TO BE CONDUCTED MONDAY MORNING WITH BURIAL IN SHARON CEMETERY

FLORA, IND., JUNE 11---D. John McCain, 95, well known Carroll County farmer, who was credited with being the first township trustee in Indiana to include music courses in rural schools, expired at 9:30 o'clock last night in the home in which he was born, three miles east of Flora.

He served as trustee of Carrollton Township from 1895 to 1900. He also was a charter member of the Wheeling Choral Union, and a trustee of the Sharon Baptist Church. He had long been active in the church, serving both as chorister and as a Sunday School teacher for more than sixty years. The deceased was born

Nov. 8, 1853, the son of David and Esther Dillon McCain, and had resided all of his life on the same farm. He was a vocal teacher as a young man.

MARRIED 65 YEARS

He and his wife, the former Ella Flora, whose parents owned a large part of the land on which the town of Flora is now located, celebrated their sixty-sixth wedding anniversary last November 11. They were married Nov. 11, 1882, at the home of the Rev. Harvey Todd in Carrollton Township. Besides the widow, he is survived by forty five direct descendants, including six children, twenty grandchildren, and nineteen great grandchildren.

Surviving children are Mrs. Manford Wagoner, Delphi; George W., Delphi; Carl B., Flora; Edwin D., Frankfort; J. Reed, Brookston; and Frank K., Flora. The body was scheduled to be returned to the residence from the Leiter Funeral Home at 4:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Rites will be held at 10:30 o'clock DST Monday morning at Wheeling Presbyterian Church because the Baptist Church is undergoing remodeling. Burial will be in the Sharon Cemetery.

CARL MCCAIN WRITES TRIP TO GERMANY

CARROLLTON TOWNSHIP BOY IS IN BLACK FORESTS TAKING COURSE IN FORESTRY-- TELLS INTERESTING STORY OF TRIP

When Carl B. McCain, son of Mr. and Mrs. D.J. McCain of Carrollton Township left for Darmstadt, Germany, where he is taking a course in the Biltmore Forest School, he told the Press he would let the people of Carroll County hear from him through it's columns and we publish the first letter received from him. It arrived Tuesday and the envelope was marked "Direckt Weg", meaning direct way or quickest route. The letter is very interesting and will interest our may readers.

Biltmore Forest School

Darmstadt, Germany,

Oct. 14, 1912

Carroll County Press:

The request has come to me for a letter telling something of my trip to Germany and of the work of the Biltmore Forest School. Anyone who has ever been to Europe is at once struck by the difference between the American cities, people and customs, and those of Europe.

We left New York on Oct. 1, on the "New Amsterdam" of the Holland-American Line, and arrived in Rotterdam, Holland, on Oct. 10. This vessel is one of the easiest vessels to cross the Atlantic on.

We didn't see a great deal of Rotterdam, but it surely is a quaint city. The streets do not run straight, but wind in every direction. Canals are seen everywhere and boats are busy carrying all sorts of commerce from place to place. One who has been used to American cities where drays carry everything wonders at the Dutch way of carrying and wheeling almost every sort of a load on hand carts. The stores are full of all sorts of trinkets and attractive objects. The Dutch are a very energetic people

We left Rotterdam on the State railway for Darmstadt early Friday morning, Oct. 11, and rode all day. The sight of the German trains is almost laughable to an American. The engines are all built in England, and are of English type. The passenger cars are about as long as an average freight car in America and only a few have a passage way into other cars. The couplers are simple hooks and a brakeman takes his life in his hands when he couples one car to another one. The freight cars are really amusing; they leave single tracks and look more like wagons than freight cars. We boys wished we might see an engine of the Pacific type pulling a modern American train, rolling by. We actually saw two men pushing a car half full of coal. One is struck by the number of uniformed persons he sees. It must be remembered that the government own and operate most of the railway systems in Europe.

The trip through Holland with its canals, windmills, low flat land, gardens and small forest tracts was full of interest. One could imagine he was on the western plains from the flatness of the land and the many cattle he sees. The American people could learn a little from the Dutch, in their methods of conservation. We saw many peasants wearing the wooden shoes for which Holland is famed.

The ride through Germany until we came to Koln was through some of the best agricultural and factory sections of Germany. We saw women, children and men working in the fields everywhere. I don't remember seeing a two horse wagon anywhere. Everywhere we saw horses and sometimes cows pulling carts.

We came to the Rhine at Cologne. Here we had a glympse of the famous Cologne Cathedral. Here we saw the high bridge across the Rhine. I saw the floating bridge which Van Blue had the pleasure of crossing.

From this point we traveled up the Rhine to Mainz. So many people have described the Rhine, and it is so beautiful, that I do not feel equal to it.
