The History of the David Mull Family  
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This Early History of the "Mull" family was taken from the History of Rush County, Indiana of 1888 and the names may be checked on the pages listed.  
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The History of the "Mull" Family in America beginning with David Mull, a native of Germany and of German Scotch Lineage, who came from Germany to America in 1740. He settled in Lancaster County, Pa. where he married. About 1757, he moved to Loudoun, County, Va, which is east and north of Washington D.C., where he died. He had five children, George being the youngest, who was our progenitor.  
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Some information passed on to Marjorie (Mull) Pebworth by her grandfather, Omar Pache (Pasche) M. Mull of Homer, Ind. (son of William Mull) was that the original name was Muhle, but one of the ancestors married a Scotch 'Mull' and changed the spelling and pronunciation because the Scottish form was easier.

He said David was an indentured Servant-or a Bondman- some one else paid his passage to America and he 'bound' himself to work for that person until he had worked out his passage money. The "Government" ? wanted the new Country settled so badly that it offered 50 acres free to anyone who would pay his own passage, 50 acres to any one who would pay someone else's passage.  
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There is an Island on the west coast of Scotland, named "Mull" belonging to 'Argyllshire', from which it is separated by the 'Sound of Mull'. The name 'Mull' could have been a family name originating from the name of th Island.

The Progress of the 'George Mull' family as they made  
a new home in the forest in Rush Co., Indiana in 1820.

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The Mull Family immigrated to Warren CO., Ohio, which is between Dayton and Cincinnati, in 1814. David Mull had died in Loudon Co. Va., which is east and north of Washington, D.C. On page 847 the History states "in March, 1826 George with two of his sons, George and Jacob, moved to Rush Co. and settled in the forest, George in Rushville Twp. and Jacob in east side of Walker Twp". It also states on page 730 that "George, the son, pushed on to Indiana to take up government land in the 'New Purchase' in 1820". Harry Mull has the Sheepskin Deed for the land signed by President James Monroe in 1820.

George, the son, erected a cabin on the land in 1820 and the following April brought his wife and family to their new home. They arrived on April 14th, and the remainder of the month the weather was terrible. They did not see the sun at all on 14 of the remaining days of April. In the new country, far from neighbors, with forest and Indians all around, the life was enough to depress the stoutest feminine heart. In later years, telling her grandchildren of the first few weeks in the new home, the pioneer woman could seldom keep back the tears, so real were the memories of the early days.

The land was so densely covered with forests that the settler had to blaze a trail on the trees when ever he went into the forest away from the existing trails. In 1820 the pioneer Mull girdled all trees less than 18 inches in diameter on a small tract, so they would not leaf out the following spring. The sun could get thru and corn would grow. The cleared spots were well protected by the dense forest, the sun warmed the ground early, and the rich soil made the corn mature early. The clearing of the land occupied most of the pioneer's time for the next few years. The squirrels were so thick, he could stand in the cabin door and shoot 20 or more. The squirrels liked the corn and some years they were so bad he had to gather the corn soon after it was out of the roasting ear stage.

Many stories of the Indians come down to us from that early day. Mr. Mull had a horse the Indians tried to steal many times, but the horse could tell their scent and always ran. Mr. Mull said he never loaned an Indian any thing that was not returned. There is an Indian buried on the Mull farm, buried standing, with his gun, tomahawk, bows and arrows and his dog. The warrior was tried and guilty of an offense punishable by death. This brave was very popular with the squaws, who when they heard of the verdict, hid all the knives and weapons, so he could not be killed. Mr. Mull took a butcher-knife to the neighbor's one day to have it sharpened. On the way home he was accosted by a band of Indians who asked to see the shiny knife. They each admired the knife and the last one ran with it. A few days later the convicted brave was killed and buried and the knife was returned to Mr. Mull. Many years later a hired man grew curious, when he heard the story. Mr. Mull gave him permission to dig up the grave if he would replace every thing as he had found it. The Indian was found standing erect with his possessions just as the story had been told.

As the agricultur of the region developed, markets opened up in Cincinnati and the annual pig crop was driven on foot each year. Somebody in the neighborhood owned a pair of "Steelyards" primitive weighing balances so a few hogs were weighed each trip so the buyers would not cheat them. To their surprise, the hogs usually gained weight on the trip.



Turkeys were also driven to market, sometimes as many as a thousand at a time. At dusk the turkeys would fly into the trees, so camp had to be made at that spot and the journey resumed the next day.

As the country became more thickly populated, markets developed and brought to the pioneers a degree of prosperity. The elder Mull decided to build a good brick house on the farm and let a contract for the burning of the bricks. When they were done, a great many of the brick were of poor quality and so badly shaped, they could not be used. They built with brick as long as they lasted and the remainder of the house was of frame construction. The frame was made of heavy timbers, mortised together after the fashion of barn frames. It was a big community event in 1845 when the frame was "raised". The original house is still there but porches and rooms have been added. A wind storm in June of 1880 twisted off oak trees 5ft. in diameter, but the house came thru safely.

When the first railroad came to the country in the early 1880's, the country voted a subsidy, to be raised by a special tax. The assessment on the Mull land amounted to \$287.50. Mr. Mull sold more than 50 hogs at 2½ cents a pound to raise the railroad assessment. The hogs brought \$292.50 so he had \$5 left to buy sugar and other necessities.

Most of this was told to the "Prairie Farmer" by William A., son of Henry C. Mull, and published April 12, 1930. He had heard the stories from his Grandparents, George and Mary Mull, told as they had lived them.

The log cabin, built by George Mull in 1820, was located on the hill just south of where the Henry C. Mull home now stands, which was later built in 1882. George built his new home in 1845, about ¼ mile west of the log cabin. He owned 920 acres of land.


Henry C. Mull (youngest son of George) and Elvira (Shaw) also lived in the log cabin after they were married until they built their new home, just north of the old cabin. The new home was built in 1882 and cost \$4000. Their children William A., Lucinda E., Mary Alice, Clara A., and Henry Wesley were all born in the log cabin and Katherine was born in the new home in 1883.


The Mull road runs east and west and is just north of the two homes. There used to be a sugar camp, grist mill, and blacksmith shop north of the road at the foot of the hill just east of the Henry C. Mull residence. There was a private road at the foot of the hill running north to a cemetery and beyond the cemetery a small settlement of four houses. At that time the main road was just south of the cemetery running east and west. The road and houses are all gone and all that remains is the 'Mull' cemetery.


George Mull and his wife, Mary, are buried in the northwest corner of the 'Mull' cemetery.

Lucinda E. and Henry Wesley Mull, Mary Alice and Wilma Mauzy, Henry C. Mull and Herbert and Knowles were all buried in the 'Mull' cemetery but later removed to the Rushville Cemetery east of Rushville. Before Luella Mauzy's death, her Grandmother Mrs. Henry C. (Elvira) Mull promised her that she would not let her be buried in the 'Mull' cemetery. So after Luella's death in 1918, three lots were purchased by the Mauzy family, Mrs. Henry C. Mull and William A. Mull at the Rushville cemetery. Later lots were also purchased by Alva and Luther Hungerfords. Luella was buried there, then the seven were moved to the Rushville Cemetery. The lots are all together and are in the part that was considered the new section in 1918. Wendel Wilke was later buried in the same section to the south so it is not hard to find.


Many of the descendants of the William Mull family, Omar and Arnold Mull families and others are also buried in the new part just across the road to the east in another section.





